Kirk DeHeer will be starting out the NMWT's 2021 programming for the New Mexico Woodturners. With over 25 years of experience, Kirk has an extensive knowledge of woodturning tools, equipment and techniques. Kirk emphasizes fundamentals, sharpening, and tool techniques.

Giving students a firm foundation on which to build their skills. Kirk has been a Resident instructor at Craft Supplies USA in the Dale L. Nish school of woodturning for more than 15 years where he has had the opportunity to work with many other turners as the assistant in the classroom.

For the January demonstration Kirk will be showing us how to do hand chased threads. He will talk about the tools and materials needed for hand chased threads, along with turning a threaded box.

Beads of Courage – NMWT's 2021 Challenge



Beads of Courage is the NMWT's Community Service Project. Beads of Courage, Inc. is a 501 (c) (3) tax exempt organization working in partnership with the American Association of Woodturners (AAW).

Our Beads of Courage Bowls are taken directly to UNMH Children's Cancer Facility here in Albuquerque for local patients. However, bowls can also be sent to a National collection point in Tucson, Arizona.

UNMH Children's Cancer Facility has been treating nearly one hundred seriously ill cancer youngsters each year. For each medical treatment a child receives, he or she gets a bead which they can then keep in their bowl, hence Beads of Courage Bowls. The children do receive a bag to put their beads in but a Beads of Courage Bowl is far more special and reflective of the hard work to beat cancer!

December's Demo: Glenn Lucas' Lidded Beaded Bowl



We were able to close out the year with by having Glenn Lucas join us via Zoom for his Lidded Beaded Bowl. This was a strategic treat and relatively new demonstration for Glenn. At left, you can see the elegant Irish Cherry piece featuring the Beads of Courage logo bead inset on the lid handle. In true form for 2020, we encountered a hiccup where Glenn's shop construction was delayed. Glenn was kind enough to chat with us in real-time as we viewed him demonstrating this project for a previous club several weeks prior. If 2020 has taught us anything it is that we must remain flexible.

Glenn began our time with him by giving us a brief tour of his new facilities as far they were competed. It looks like a marvelous place with more to offer than a complete immersion in woodturning. For those interested in heading to Co. Carlow reach out to NMWT's own Brad Carvey as his wife, Andrea, and he spent time there in 2019 with Glenn and Cornelia.

We kickstarted the Lidded Beaded Bowl project by discussing dimensions and form. Of course, Beads of Courage has specific minimum dimensions, but we began with two pieces of Irish Cherry sized 6" diameter by 3" thickness and 6" diameter by ~1-3/4" thickness for bowl and lid, respectively, to accomplish the form Glenn is targeting. In many cases, this timber can be found dried in a local or online wood supplier. However, sizes much bigger than dry 12/4 lumber can be cost prohibitive. We briefly discussed that this project is turned in sidegrain, or bowl orientation, with the end grain rotating about the axis of the lathe. This should not prohibit you from turning your Beads of Courage box in your preferred orientation. Glenn also mentioned that, while grain matching the lid and bowl is possible, it becomes challenging to grain match side grain pieces unless they're obtained from the log with forethought and rough turned much in advance.





December's Demo: Lidded Beaded Bowl Cont'd



Much of the beginning of the project focused on the fundamentals of side-grain bowl turning. This included truing the blank, establishing a robust tenon, finely tuned to match the chuck jaws, and refining the outside curve of the bowl to meet the desired form. Above and left, Glenn is truing the bottom of the bowl and forming a tenon. Above and right is Glenn's diamond point scraper sharpened to perfectly match his chuck's dovetail jaws. Below and left Glenn is demonstrating a sheer cut to finely shape and eliminate torn grain.



The "Oooh's" and "Aaah's" of the demo were certainly attributed to Glenn's turning of the beads. Glenn attributes learning this technique at the feet of Richard Raffan and he can clearly turn beads in his sleep. Glenn discussed that this technique is very efficient but challenging. He uses his freshly sharpened 3/8" spindle gouge maintaining bevel contact the *entire* time. His first pass establishes the bead width and the second, and final, pass refine the bead's finish. Sanding these beads will need to be kept to a minimum for a delicate approach with a sharp tool is essential. The bowl is then reversed and hollowed out as desired.

December's Demo: Lidded Beaded Bowl Cont'd



We then moved our attention to the lid. Glenn used a large faceplate to attach the lid piece to the lathe. He placed the screws on the outer edge of the piece since that material would be removed in the final form of the lid. Once the lid was dimensioned to fit the bowl nicely, the interior was hollowed out to a pleasing curve. Above is Glenn's scraper that's profiled to his need to reverse mount the lid on chuck jaws in expansion mode. Remember to leave your lid's lip large enough that gently expansion of the chuck jaws do not break the rim.



To shape the lid, Glenn reverse mounted the piece in expanding jaws. The shape is best established with a pulling sheer cut to obtain the flowing curves. Once the curve is to your liking, it's back to beading. The exact process for the bowl was repeated in the lid with gentle care and precision. Once the lid is complete, attention can be turned back to the bowl for completing the foot. Glenn gently used expanding chuck jaws to mount the bowl but this can be done with a jam chuck. The foot is refined and the bowl is sanded. And there you have it — a lidded beaded bowl!


Web-Based Credit Card Dues Payment Now Available

Most of our NMWT memberships are currently set up on a calendar year basis with expirations at the end of December. So now is the time to start renewing memberships for 2021 and beyond for those who need to (your current membership expiration date should be listed on your membership card).

We are very pleased to announce that you can now pay your membership dues with a credit card on the NMWT website at https://www.nmwoodturners.org/. To access online dues payment, simply go to the new "Membership" tab near the top of the homepage and select "Pay Online" from the dropdown menu. This will take you to a secure website managed by Converge, our credit card service provider. There you will find a series of "Buy Buttons" that are clearly labeled with each membership dues option (i.e. 1 Yr Individual Membership \$25, 2 Yr Family Membership \$55, etc.) Simply select the dues option that you want and then hit the "Checkout" button. You will need to fill in all of the contact information on the payment processing page so that the Treasurer can confirm that our membership records are up to date and also so that he can send your new membership card by regular mail. Also, due to some reporting limitations of the Converge website, you will need to once again select the dues option you want from the drop-down menu labeled "Items Purchased". Fill in your credit card information and hit the "Submit Payment" button to complete the transaction. You should receive an "Order Confirmation" with full details of your purchase by e-mail, and the Treasurer with mail your membership card to you. That's all there is to it!

You can, of course, still mail a check along with current contact and e-mail information to our Treasurer, Tom Durgin at 39 Magic Valley Rd., Sandia Park, NM 87047. The easy way to do that is to go to that same new "Membership" tab on the NMWT homepage and select "Membership Form" from the drop-down menu. Fill in the form (PLEASE PRINT CLEARLY) and mail it to Tom with your check. Should you have any issues or questions regarding the new Credit Card payment system or if you are not sure if your membership expires at the end of 2020, feel free to call Tom at 505-688-1369 or e-mail him at f250tom@msn.com.

We hope that the new dues payment option encourages members to renew soon as the club has operated in the red for most of this year due to COVID and the resulting loss of normal revenue streams such as raffles, silent auctions, etc. It is also easier on the Treasurer if the membership renewals are spread out a bit rather than everyone waiting until the last minute to renew.






Additionally, the NMWTs are branching out into the world of YouTube. Our first few videos are snippets from a mid-month virtual social gathering where sharpening was shared.

- 12. And much, much more... just keep looking






