Tri-corner, or three-winged, turnings are more of a principle than a particular project. This month, Scott Kershaw and Don Roden will be tag-teaming at the lathe to demonstrate general principles and projects by turning a cube on a bias. These three-winged projects have numerous uses and can take on more profound “how’d you do that!” type of reaction from the folks who see your work. Saturday will begin with Scott discussing stock orientation at the lathe followed by work holding and cutting methods. Once the general principles of turning a tri-corner form are discussed and shown, Don will guide us through making a more complex take on the turning – a 3-winged box. Beyond hollowing, this will require planning for ensuring the mating surfaces of the lid and bottom are harmonious and neat. In an effort to take a small break from “round and brown,” this Saturday will be intriguing with mixed grain orientation, interrupted cuts and fun ways to catch the eyes of clients, friends, family and fellow turners alike.



Beads of Courage – NMWT's 2021 Challenge



Beads of Courage is the NMWT's Community Service Project. Beads of Courage, Inc. is a 501 (c) (3) tax exempt organization working in partnership with the American Association of Woodturners (AAW).

Our Beads of Courage Bowls are taken directly to UNMH Children's Cancer Facility here in Albuquerque for local patients. However, bowls can also be sent to a National collection point in Tucson, Arizona.

UNMH Children's Cancer Facility has been treating nearly one hundred seriously ill cancer youngsters each year. For each medical treatment a child receives, he or she gets a bead which they can then keep in their bowl, hence Beads of Courage Bowls. The children do receive a bag to put their beads in but a Beads of Courage Bowl is far more special and reflective of the hard work to beat cancer!

May's Demo: Sierra Vessel by Trent Bosch



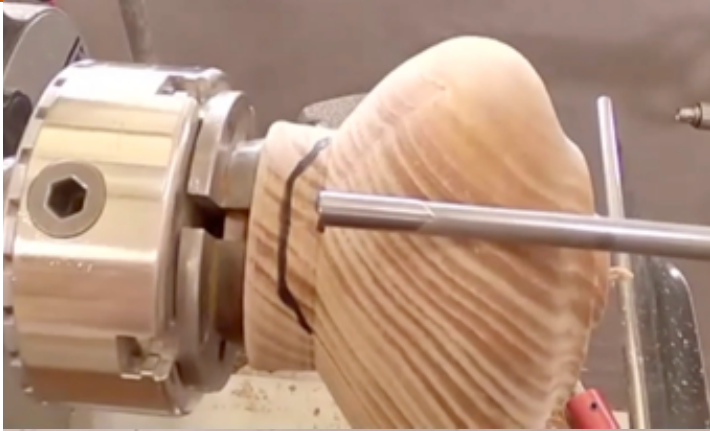
May's demo was a wonderful experience as we had the pleasure of Trent Bosch demonstrating his "Sierra Vessel" series which includes hollowing, cutting, carving, sanding and sandblasting. Trent began with a green, open-grained timber – elm in this case – to accentuate the grain variation and contrast between the exterior and the "emerging" vessel within. Notice the photos below that he has oriented the blank to allow for noticeable grain running across the piece at an angle; a process that began with cutting the blank from the log. He then trued the blank, cut in a precise tendon and roughed out the bottom a bit. The blank was then rotated, placed in the chuck and the vessel shape came to life. Note that Trent took care to shape the two "rims" and undercut the exterior rim at bottom left.

After the exterior shape is pleasing, attention was turned to hollowing. Once the initial entry was defined, Trent used a “gun drill” to define the depth of the hollow form. Hollowing sequence is drawn to the left and Trent hollows in numerical order starting with the straight tool – he tries to do as much as possible with the straight tool using his body to maintain a fluid motion.



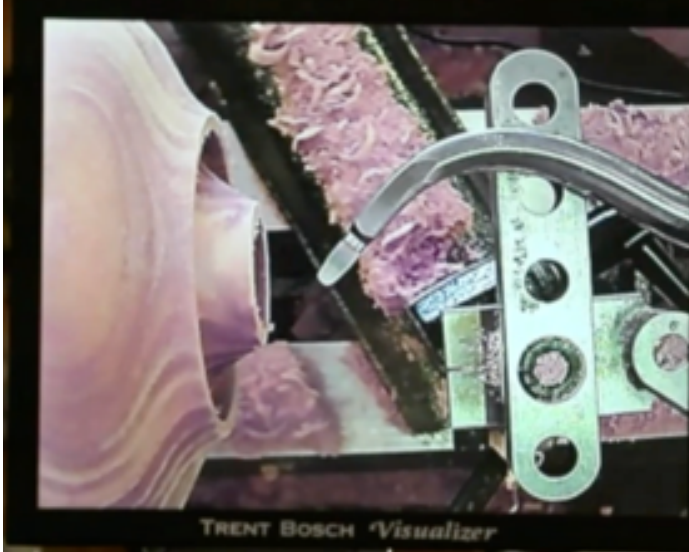
Once areas 1 through 4 are cleared out, Trent turns his attention to the bent hollowing tool. Again, using fluid body motions, he sweeps the tool inside to clear from center out then wall toward center.

Remember that all this hollowing can be accomplished with the tools “by hand.” Trent showed that each tool is perfectly usable without a stabilizing system. However, a hollowing system provides stability, efficiency and predictability. More on Trent’s system to come.

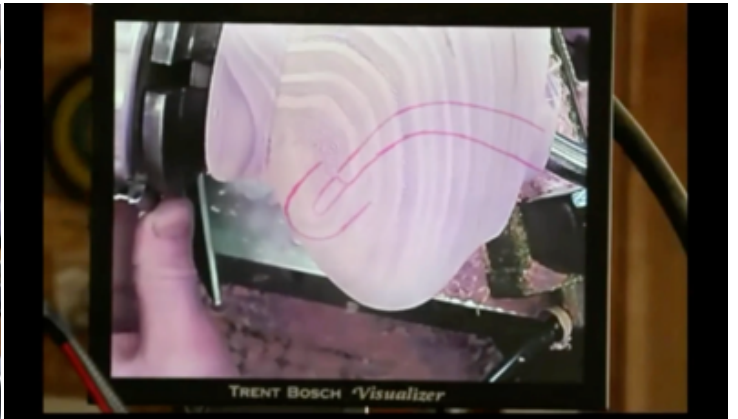
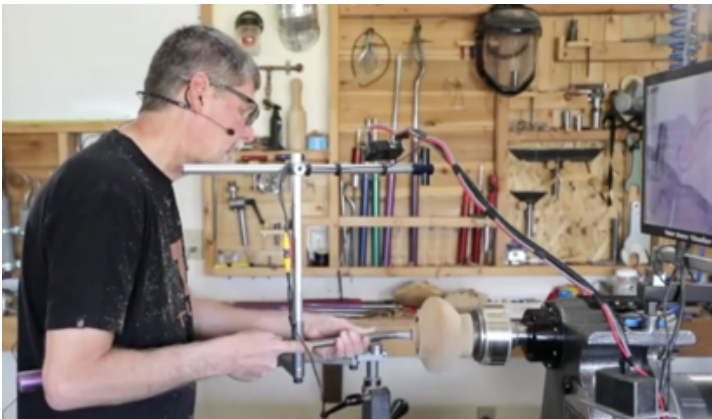

May's Demo: Sierra Vessel Cont'd



Using the Trent's Visualizer setup with the stabilizing system, he can get extremely consistent walls and better see the progress deep in the vessel. The Visualizer allows the turner to see the exact top of the tool and space around the cutter. Since the piece will be carved, having a known wall thickness is essential to accomplish the vessel and allow for the relief. Still, Trent uses his body to sweep the cutter in the vessel. This helps him enjoy the process and get consistent and efficient cuts.



To finalize the interior of the vessel, Trent uses the bent tool with a large radius scraper to level out the humps, lumps and bumps using a negative rake approach. This is done without the stabilizing system and by feel. You can see the finished surface above and to the right. Since all the bulk is removed, the cuts are light and smooth. Once the unevenness is removed, the interior is complete.

Now that the vessel is turned to completion sans the tenon, Trent places the form in his carving stand. Here he draws out the shape for the relief carving. He noted that he usually tries to follow a single growth line around the form, reiterating the grain orientation upon cutting the blank for the tree and mounting the blank initially between centers. Using various air-powered tools, Trent cares off the exterior rim then carves the emerging vessel along his growth ring line. Recall, that the hollow form had a uniform thickness that was made quite predictably with the Visualizer. Now, Trent can carve his reliefs to a depth and plenty of wall thickness remains and is consistent throughout the form. Once the relief is roughed out, Trent turns to an angle die grinder with a sanding disk to blend. He also uses a reciprocating carver with a 'v' chisel to crisp up the lines followed by a rotary cutter that undercuts the line to cast a shadow hinting at the inner vessel emerging from the exterior shell.

Trent does as much of the carving, sanding and blending as possible with the air powered tools. Of course, it's hard to imagine that such fine pieces can be accomplished without ol' fashioned elbow grease by hand sanding. Trent spends plenty of time refining the piece by hand sanding. The hand sanding is essential to eliminating all the tooling marks and keeping the eye from homing in on an unnatural emergence.



Once the reliefs are perfect to his liking, Trent uses a "drum chuck" to nestle the form inside and he turns off the tenon. In that process he creates a small, elegant foot with a subtle hollow. The piece is then masked off where appropriate and sandblasted to enhance the grain structure. As seen below in two of Trent's finished pieces, the sandblasting separates the early wood from the late wood creating a defined texture. The piece is then finished with his final fixative spray to protect the piece but retain an organic feel.

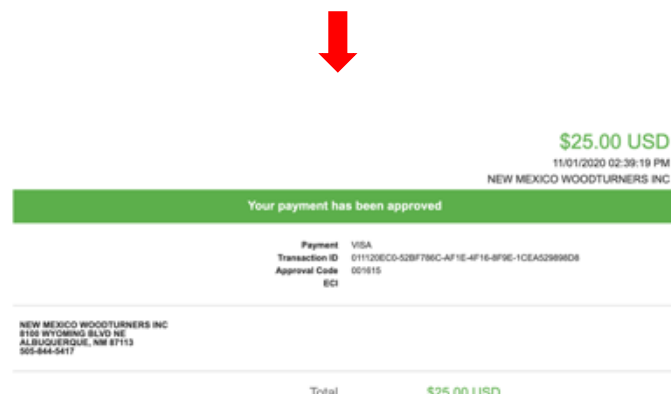
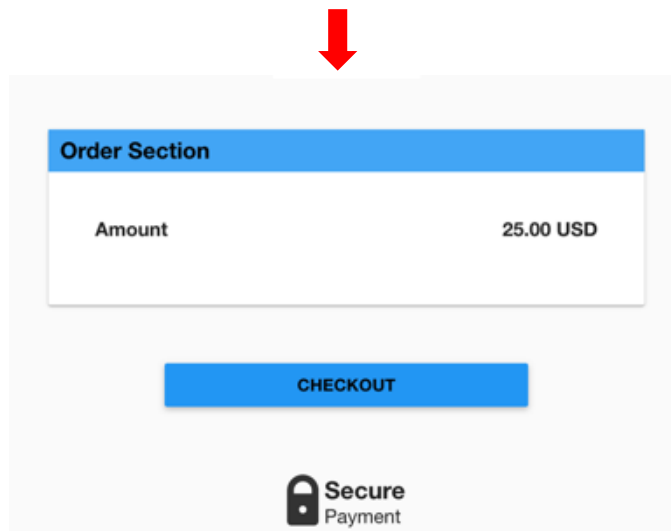
Web-Based Credit Card Dues Payment Now Available

Most of our NMWT memberships are currently set up on a calendar year basis with expirations at the end of December. So now is the time to start renewing memberships for 2021 and beyond for those who need to (your current membership expiration date should be listed on your membership card).

We are very pleased to announce that you can now pay your membership dues with a credit card on the NMWT website at <https://www.nmwoodturners.org/>. To access online dues payment, simply go to the new “Membership” tab near the top of the homepage and select “Pay Online” from the drop-down menu. This will take you to a secure website managed by Converge, our credit card service provider. There you will find a series of “Buy Buttons” that are clearly labeled with each membership dues option (i.e. 1 Yr Individual Membership \$25, 2 Yr Family Membership \$55, etc.) Simply select the dues option that you want and then hit the “Checkout” button. You will need to fill in all of the contact information on the payment processing page so that the Treasurer can confirm that our membership records are up to date and also so that he can send your new membership card by regular mail. Also, due to some reporting limitations of the Converge website, you will need to once again select the dues option you want from the drop-down menu labeled “Items Purchased”. Fill in your credit card information and hit the “Submit Payment” button to complete the transaction. You should receive an “Order Confirmation” with full details of your purchase by e-mail, and the Treasurer with mail your membership card to you. That’s all there is to it!

You can, of course, still mail a check along with current contact and e-mail information to our Treasurer, Tom Durgin at 39 Magic Valley Rd., Sandia Park, NM 87047. The easy way to do that is to go to that same new “Membership” tab on the NMWT homepage and select “Membership Form” from the drop-down menu. Fill in the form (PLEASE PRINT CLEARLY) and mail it to Tom with your check. Should you have any issues or questions regarding the new Credit Card payment system or if you are not sure if your membership expires at the end of 2020, feel free to call Tom at 505-688-1369 or e-mail him at f250tom@msn.com.

We hope that the new dues payment option encourages members to renew soon as the club has operated in the red for most of this year due to COVID and the resulting loss of normal revenue streams such as raffles, silent auctions, etc. It is also easier on the Treasurer if the membership renewals are spread out a bit rather than everyone waiting until the last minute to renew.
