New Mexico Woodturners 2021 "Pens for the Military" Project

We have a new event that I'd like to encourage each of you to participate however you can. As a club, we're working to turn several hundred Slim Line pens to donate to the military. This is a great opportunity for brand new and experienced woodturners. Please plan to participate in either or both phases. You should get details in a club mailing shortly but here's the summary:

Phase 1. Pen turning in your shop: If you have pen kits and blanks, you can start turning now. If you are missing either of the components, you will be able to pick them up from AEW. For the time being, the pen kits are free to members, as they are being paid for by a long time member (who wishes no publicity). A fair number of free blanks will also be available thanks to donations by NMWT members. AEW will also have some for sale. If you opt to order your own, please stick with Slim Line pens to make sure they fit the pocket slits of the military uniforms.

When you pick up a pen kit or kits (or blanks) from AEW, you will be asked to sign a form guaranteeing you will return the kit(s) or completed pen(s) to AEW or NMWT by May 22, 2021.

Phase 2. Saturday, May 29, from 10 AM to 3 PM, we will be turning pens at Albuquerque Exotic Woods. You may bring your own pen kits and/or blanks or make use of others provided by NMWT and/or AEW. Mentors will be on hand to assist anyone who has limited or no experience in pen turning. Bring your own turning tools (a spindle gouge at the least). If you have them, please bring a pen mandrel and/or sets of bushings for Slim Line pens. Sandpaper and finishes will be available. Please be aware that Saturday is AEW's busiest day, and parking is limited. We turners will be parking in the rear of the store, where about 11 spaces are available. We expect to have 4 or 5 lathes in operation all day, but we ask each participant to turn for just an hour or two to let everyone have a turn. If you can participate on the 29th, please contact Larry Linford (505-870-1601 or Idlinford@yahoo.com) ASAP with the time slot you would like to be assigned, and whether or not you will need pen kits and/or blanks.

If you would like to donate pen blanks, please cut them (each pen requires two pieces, cut 2 1/8 inches long) and drill them all the way through with a 7 mm bit.

Don't forget, we always welcome NEW MEMBERS to join New Mexico Woodturners. All that's needed is an interest in woodturning. Stay well, stay safe, and see you at one of our demos or social events.

For each medical treatment a child receives, he or she gets a bead which they can then keep in their bowl, hence Beads of Courage Bowls. The children do receive a bag to put their beads in but a Beads of Courage Bowl is far more special and reflective of the hard work to beat cancer!

Green Wood Cont'd

We have new Green Wood Committee chairpersons, Bert & Kay Grant! In the last few weeks they've gathered up some green wood and are excited to get it into NMWT members' hand. When you get some, below is an article from AAW to help your keep your wood in turning order.

HOW TO SAVE TURNING BLANKS

Saving Wood

I don't know about you, but I have always had trouble saving wood. Free wood seems to come in batches, and usually when I have a lot of work to do in my real job and can't get to it. Consequently, it sits in the yard and cracks, gets filled with bugs, turns punky, and is basically unusable. Then I have to figure out how to haul it to the dump. It's not fun to watch that prized walnut or cherry log slowly go this way.

Like many of you, I have experimented with all of the "cheaper" alternatives such as paint, roofing tar, glue, etc. I even tried commercial end-grain sealers and decided they didn't work either. When I moved into my new house, I decided I had to find a way to save, or at least prolong, the useful life of this free, green wood.

The first step was to understand the problem. Drying is the reason the wood checks. Sun and wind are two main factors that speed up the drying. Bugs are the other problem. Getting the wood off the ground and covering it is one solution. These proved impractical for me because the logs were too large and the only way to cover them was to throw a tarp over them, which was unsightly, and I didn't want to do that to the neighbors (who were nice enough to put up with me running a chainsaw frequently). I tried end grain sealer again, using two coats this time, and it does seem to help, but only postpones the end checking for a few weeks or so. Some logs I cut up into 3- or 4-foot sections and stood them on



end. I covered the open end with black plastic trash bags. I've used these logs several months down the line with only a little loss. The bugs still get at them and, of course, fungus starts, so this is a double edged sword. Good if it spalts, bad if the bugs eat it up. However, for short term storage this works quite well and may give me time to use plan B, which is cut the wood into bowl blanks and cover them with wax.

Of course, you never get to them fast enough if you get a lot of wood so I needed another way to save some of the wood. I take the logs that were starting to split and cut them in half through the biggest check. Then I go to the bandsaw and cut them into spindle and box stock. I draw or cut squares, starting as large as I can. I'll cut the sections as long as I can handle on the bandsaw. For example, I start with 4x4 and then 3x3, 2x2 and even 1x1 if I can. This gives me stock for everything from boxes and tool handles down to ornament finials and mirror handles. I cut off any checks on the ends and then coat the ends with two coats of end-grain sealer. After several years of doing this, I now have a lot of dry or partially dry stock for these projects.

The methods above have saved a lot of wood that would have been tossed. However, they were less than successful at saving bowl and hollow vessel blanks. Several years ago at Thanksgiving, my father found some fresh-cut ornamental cherry logs in a neighbor's yard. I talked to the gentleman and filled the trunk of my car with the fresh-cut logs. I always have trouble saving cherry and these were already just large enough for bowl and vessel blanks. If I had any checking at all, they would be gone. Fortunately, I had just started using a new technique for me, waxing the whole blank. When I buy exotic woods, they often come completely covered in wax. I thought I could try that and see if it worked.

I picked up an old electric skillet at the flea market. I heated some paraffin wax until I found the temperature that just melted it. I hot-glued the temperature setting at this mark. Even though this was low enough not to cause a fire, I kept the metal lid of the skillet handy just in case. Then I cut the bowl blanks and rolled them in the wax sealing all surfaces. On larger bowl blanks I was only able to roll the edges in the wax. For hollow vessels, I dipped the round cut ends in the wax. I didn't really know what to expect but it has been wonderful. At the same time I also dipped some fresh cut apple blanks in the wax. I put these aside in the shop and let them sit until they started to check, just to see how long it would take.

The fully coated pieces have lasted for almost two years. The wax is starting to peel off. I may be able to freshly wax them and make them last longer. The vessel blanks that were coated on just the ends did well for a little over a year before starting to check. I even roughturned the outside of one hollow vessel, but not the inside, then coated the whole thing with wax. It held up for a little over a year before it started to check. The pieces turn like they are still green, but don't throw as much water.

A friend suggested another alternative. Fill a small can with wax and

You will have more control when you heat the wax, pour it into a can, and then paint it onto larger blanks.

let it sit in the skillet. Then you can take this can of melted wax and paint the wax onto larger blanks that would not fit in the skillet. AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF WOODTURNERS

Paraffin wax melts between 117 and 147 degrees. The flash point is 390 degrees. Keep the temperature down to minimize risk, and keep a lid and safety supplies handy.

When I get wood now, the first thing I do is decide how soon I can get to it. I will put plastic bags over the ends. In the next week or so, I will cut them to a manageable lengths, lay one end on the ground, and seal the other end with endgrain sealer. Then I cut and rough any bowls that I have time to do. If it looks like I won't get to rough any more or don't know what plans I have for the wood, I will cut the wood into bowl blanks, vessel blanks, or simply squares or rectangles. If I think I'll get to it within a reasonable amount of time, I seal just the end-grain. For special pieces with curly grain, I seal all of it with wax. Then, I cut the rest up into spindle stock and seal the ends with wax.

This method has allowed me to save wood that would have gone bad. I just started cutting up thicker platter blanks and will see how long it takes them to dry and what kind of warping problems I will have. I'm expecting some decent results from this.

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For April's virtual demo, we had the pleasure of having Don Roden turn in his shop space. He demonstrated offset turning between centers and using some jigs – purchased and homemade. We began the demo by reviewing the principles of offset, multi-axis or eccentric turning. Don discussed the principle of turning the timber parallel to the lathe bed and skewed (non-parallel) to the ways. Below and left, the three photos show the various mounting options between centers. The offset can be as simple or as complex as the turner prefers. We then shifted gears to a quick "Spectraply" box with three "sides" created by aligning planned points on each end.

As for offset turning jig, Don first showed a commercial product, now purchased through Ruth Niles (<u>Off Center Jig Kit</u>). With this, Don turned a little duckling shape and a pendent with inlayed pieces. It's clear the options are limitless. Don finished off the demo with some things in the works. He quickly showed an offset finial and some offset bowls. **The main points, reiterated by Don frequently, are that you "cut" lots of air and your cuts count – make it clean!!!**

Don would like to share with you some thoughts and observations from his Offset Turning presentation last month: "I spent most of my time in the shop the previous month and a half preparing for the demonstration. I read different things, bought a book, and tried different things on the lathe.

Toward the end, I tried the Bowl in a Bowl and noticed that my bowl turning skills had improved greatly. I seemed to be challenged by the transition inside from the wall to the bottom and most of the time it was little to non-existent. Or maybe I would resort to a scrapper to make a decent transition.

After all the prep work for the demo, I noticed that my transitions are better, easier, and smooth with a Bowl Gouge and very little scrapping. My spindle turning has also improved with both the spindle gouge and the Skew.

I say all of this to encourage you to push yourself in trying new techniques because you never know the unintended results that will make you a better turner in the areas that you already excel."

Balancing CBN Wheels

The Experience

I am very happy with the CBN grinding wheels I have, however, when I first installed them they seemed to run pretty smooth at speed but I noticed a couple of harmonic vibration episodes as they slowed after turning off the motor. Such vibration is caused by imbalance and if not corrected, I suspect uneven wear would show up in time.

The Cause

You would think that these machined aluminum wheels would be inherently balanced and they probably are pretty good before the CBN layer is added. The application of the CBN grit is probably done by electroplating and how perfectly it is done effects the balance. The deposition rate of the binding metal layer that holds the grit is controlled by current density in the plating bath. To a large extent, the distance between the anode and the work (cathode) controls current density and therefore the plating thickness and balance. In the case of plating on the perimeter of a wheel, the ideal anode shape would be a ring around the wheel and then to have the wheel exactly centered. If the wheel were not centered in an anode ring, we should expect the plating to be thicker where the wheel is closer to the anode and thinner where the distance is greater.

Balancing Fixture

I had a ONEWAY[®] grinding wheel balancing fixture on hand so I thought I would give it a try. Unfortunately, the fixture was delivered with shielded bearing, which have too much friction to enable fine balancing. Therefore, I ordered a set of open ball bearing, which can be seen installed in Figure 1 (right). The OD of the bearing is 5/8" matching the ID of the CBN wheel and when the wheel was placed on the fixture, it defiantly showed imbalance by always stopping rotation with the same heavy area at the bottom.

Simple Static Balance

My friend who loves to complicate things suggested that I dynamically balance my wheels but I don't have the equipment and it probably wouldn't improve their function over a simple static balance.

The balancing process is very simple, let the wheel settle with the heavy area at the bottom and then drill out a little metal where it is heavy. Keep repeating the process until you can place the wheel in any angle of rotation and it stays put. I found that I had to chase the heavy spot a little as the heavy spot seemed to move a bit as I removed weight. Also, I tried to remove equal amounts on each side of the wheel so not to cause dynamic imbalance.


Web-Based Credit Card Dues Payment Now Available

Most of our NMWT memberships are currently set up on a calendar year basis with expirations at the end of December. So now is the time to start renewing memberships for 2021 and beyond for those who need to (your current membership expiration date should be listed on your membership card).

We are very pleased to announce that you can now pay your membership dues with a credit card on the NMWT website at https://www.nmwoodturners.org/. To access online dues payment, simply go to the new "Membership" tab near the top of the homepage and select "Pay Online" from the dropdown menu. This will take you to a secure website managed by Converge, our credit card service provider. There you will find a series of "Buy Buttons" that are clearly labeled with each membership dues option (i.e. 1 Yr Individual Membership \$25, 2 Yr Family Membership \$55, etc.) Simply select the dues option that you want and then hit the "Checkout" button. You will need to fill in all of the contact information on the payment processing page so that the Treasurer can confirm that our membership records are up to date and also so that he can send your new membership card by regular mail. Also, due to some reporting limitations of the Converge website, you will need to once again select the dues option you want from the drop-down menu labeled "Items Purchased". Fill in your credit card information and hit the "Submit Payment" button to complete the transaction. You should receive an "Order Confirmation" with full details of your purchase by e-mail, and the Treasurer with mail your membership card to you. That's all there is to it!

You can, of course, still mail a check along with current contact and e-mail information to our Treasurer, Tom Durgin at 39 Magic Valley Rd., Sandia Park, NM 87047. The easy way to do that is to go to that same new "Membership" tab on the NMWT homepage and select "Membership Form" from the drop-down menu. 

Bill is planning on renting a 12-ft box truck (which will easily hold 400 blanks, likely more), and having them back in Albuquerque in late June. We estimate that the one way truck rental and gasoline will be \$1000. Here's an example of how this would work: 25 club members decide to help share the expenses of the truck, at \$40 each. Assuming 400 blanks, that's 16 blanks per member, or \$2.50 per piece of wood (that's assuming Bill only loads 400 pieces in the 12-ft box truck). Bill is happy if all the wood goes to NMWT members and does not need to retain any. (If you've seen Bill's garage, you'll know why...). Wood will be dispersed randomly to members – no "cherry picking" species for ease of logistics




