

The New Mexico State Fair is a GO again this year and WE are participating.

As in previous years, our display and demonstrations will be in the Creative Arts Building.

Entries will be accepted on Friday August 26 and Saturday August 27 9:00 am to 5:00 pm both days. To see the Premium Book (State Fair and NMWT rules) online, go to Expo NM, click on State Fair, under Participate click on Competitions, click on Creative Arts, scroll down to 2022 Premium Books, scroll down to woodturners and click one more time and you are there.

Starting last year the NM State Fair Commission charges a \$5 per person entry fee for all Creative Arts entrants. Our Board of Directors has again determined that we will reimburse the \$5 entry fee to all NMWT members entering in the woodturning section.

The State Fair is a fantastic opportunity to show the public some of the useful and beautiful things we can create from a chunk of wood. It also provides an opportunity for us to promote the New Mexico WoodTurners.

2022 State Fair Forms

Entering a turning, or any number of turnings, gets you a written critique of every entry by some of the best turners in New Mexico, and maybe even a ribbon or two.

If you are a member of the American Association of Woodturners or become a member, (you can join instantly online) you can demonstrate at the fair. Our insurance for demonstrators is through the AAW.

The State Fair provides the venue and the ribbons and the NMWT's provide about 460 man/hours to make it all work.

The fair provides free parking, and free admission, and if you request it, transportation for you and your tools to and from the parking lot. Albuquerque Exotic Woods will Provide turning blanks suitable for turning tops, goblets, small end grain bowls, small boxes, bottle stoppers, etc. Or you can bring your own wood and turn whatever you like. When you are in the neighborhood stop by AEW and thank Johnathan for his generosity.

For each medical treatment a child receives, he or she gets a bead which they can then keep in their bowl, hence Beads of Courage Bowls. The children do receive a bag to put their beads in, but a Beads of Courage Bowl is far more special and reflective of the hard work to beat cancer!

Beads of Courage Update

Ron Bahm and I delivered three Beads of Courage (BOC) bowls to the Child Life Department at the UNM Children's Hospital in Albuquerque the 23rd of June. The bonus of this "field trip" was to meet the BOC point of contact for the UNM Children's Hospital, Lacey Anderson, and come away with an understanding of how and why the bowls end up with a particular child. Lacey Anderson is the Beads of Courage contact, among other things, for the UNM Children's Hospital, and thus, the club's point of contact at the hospital. While Scott Eckstein is the club's BOC Chair, we are encouraged to deliver the BOC bowls or vessels to Lacey in person.

Lacey is a Certified Child Life Specialist, in the Child Life Department, at the UNM Children's Hospital. When I spoke with her, she was very excited that we were interested in supporting the parents and children in the BOC program (she is new to this role). Lacey explained to me that the children have several choices in terms of what they can do with the beads they receive as a result of their surgeries and therapies (such as chemo, etc.) In addition to collecting them in a BOC bowl or vessel, they can put them in a glass vase, string them together to make a necklace, make various art projects, and other creative and expressive things.

I told Lacey that our club would like to know about the child who receives a BOC bowl or vessel (e.g., their story, name and photo), and she said that would not be a problem provided the parents sign a release form.

The BOC program provides a fun and easy way for you to support children coping with a serious illness. If you are moved to create a BOC bowl or vessel, and would like to deliver it in person, call or email Lacey before going to arrange for a time to meet with her. WIT (Women in Turning) is "dedicated to encouraging and assisting women in their pursuit of turning, sharing ideas and processes to further member's skills and creativity, and increasing participation of women in the field of woodturning."

The AAW WIT Committee agrees that to further this mission, we can work with chapters to help grow the number of women in AAW. Currently, women comprise less the 9% of AAW membership.

To encourage women to join AAW, the WIT Committee offers a limited number of WIT sponsored half price AAW memberships to women for a one-year, full "General" AAW membership.





WE ARE TEACHING THE WORLD TO TURN

<u>Eligibility</u> To be eligible, a grant recipient must be a woman and who has never previously been a member of AAW.

<u>Process</u> Only the chapter AAW WIT Liaison, Kay Grant and Sally Breeden, chapter president or vice-president may request the grant. After we've received the application, the recipient will be sent a promotional code with instructions on how to use the code in applying for an AAW membership. If you have questions, please email wit@woodturner.org.

Limitations

If the nominee is a <u>new member</u> of a local chapter (within the last two months), WIT will pay 100% of the AAW membership.

If the nominee <u>has been a member of a local chapter for more than two months</u>, WIT will pay 50% of the AAW membership.

If the nominee is not a member of a local chapter, WIT will pay 50% of the AAW membership.

Grants are currently limited to no more than two women, per chapter, per quarter.

Quarters end January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31. Based on the number of requests, this limitation may change.

We hope that this offer will be an incentive for MEXICO new women woodturners to join your chapter.

Fractal Burning Kills; AAW Reiterates the Dangers

From the AAW Safety Committee

The AAW Board, through its Safety Committee, wants to reemphasize the dangers associated with the process known as Lichtenberg, or "fractal," burning, an embellishing technique that uses high-voltage electrical current to burn patterns on wood. This often unsafe, life-threatening practice has once again surfaced in the news and on social media, following a two-victim incident in April 2022.

In 2017, the AAW Board of Directors voted to ban any fractal-burning demonstrations and equipment sales at AAW-sponsored events. The ban prohibits displaying fractal-burned pieces at any AAW-sponsored event and promoting the practice via articles in AAW publications. Sadly, since the AAW Board adopted its policy on fractal burning in 2017, there have

been thirty-three reported deaths directly attributed to fractal burning, and an unknown number of injuries and close calls.

Learn About the Hidden Dangers

Fractal burning poses a significant hidden risk of electrocution. It speaks volumes that there are no UL-rated fractal burning units commercially available. Many of the YouTube videos that show how to build these devices at home do not adequately address the inherent safety concerns. Many users think they are being safe, but the number of serious injuries and deaths says otherwise.



DIY Mini Sanding Disks for a Dremel

So I make my own disks, using a method I learned from J. Paul Fennell about 10 years ago. Paul is one of the best turners in the world, and if you visit his web site (jpaulfennell.com), you will see why precise, small-scale sanding is an absolute must for him.

You Will Need



Photo 2: Craftool punch and

screw mandrel

- 1. Cloth-backed sandpaper. Surplus but not worn sanding belts work really well. Disclosure: I have not tried paper-backed or mesh-backed sandpaper like Abralon.)
- 2. Double-stick tape, like carpet tape or tape made for woodworkers.
- 3. A 3/8" diameter punch available from Tandy, Amazon, etc. (Photos 2)
- 4. A Screw Mandrell with 8 mm head and 3/32" shank, with the screw and washer removed available

from https://bursforcarving.com/8mm-screw-mandrel/ (Photos 2 and 3)

- 5. Scissors
- 6. A hammer
- 7. A medium sized hex wrench
- 8. A scrap board to serve as an anvil.

Making the Disks

- 1. Cut sandpaper to size (if necessary), and lay rough side down on the anvil.
- 2. Peel double-sided tape from roll (but leave the cover paper on the back side) and press firmly onto the back side of sandpaper (Photo 4).
- 3. Using the punch and hammer, cut disks from the tape and sandpaper. Two or three moderate strikes are better than one mighty blow which will drive the disk deep into the punch (Photo 5).
- 4. If the disk stays in the punch tube, insert the short leg of the hex wrench through the side hole in the punch and push it out (Photo 6).
- 5. Punch out all the disks for which you have sufficient tape/sandpaper mated (Photo 7).
- 6. Make disks of multiple grits. I use 100, 150 and 220, and rarely use the 100. (The coarser the paper, the more likely it is to "dig-in.")

Using the Disks

- 1. Peel the paper off the back of the disk and stick the disk on the Screw Mandrel mounted the in Dremel (Photo 8).
- 2. Start with a slow to medium speed and press lightly as you apply the disk to wood, since even a relatively fine grit can dig in and gouge your work. Also, if you generate too much heat with higher speeds, your disk will disappear into the ether.
- 3. For use on inlay veins, tilt the hand tool so only the outside edge of the disk makes contact. For sanding flat surfaces, make sure hand tool is as vertical as possible. (I recommend practicing a bit before using these on your nearly completed project.)
- 4. Check sanding surface of disk frequently and replace as needed.

Friction Drive for Turning Tenons

I turn a lot of items from tree branch pieces or fairly small sections of trunk. It's hard for me to get both end cuts parallel, and to define the desired center axis on both ends of a rough-cut blank. When I try to start the piece between centers, I often end up with a lot of wobble. Turning that down to a smooth cylinder is not particularly difficult, but I end up cutting away more of the diameter than I would like. Lately, I've been using a friction-drive approach, which I find to be faster and less wasteful.

To make the friction drive, I took a 6" diameter faceplate, and mounted an 8" diameter plywood disk to it. After truing up the disc on the lathe, I glued 80 grit sandpaper to the plywood. The sandpaper provides more than enough friction to drive small and medium workpieces. To prepare my blank, I try to cut one end of the branch perpendicular to the primary axis. I then mark and center-punch my chosen axis center on the other end of the log. Locating the point of a revolving center in that center-punch divot, I advance the tailstock until the squared end of the log is pressed against the friction drive disc. It's easy to get that end of the log to sit flat on the friction disc, by adjusting it with my fingers as I tighten the tailstock quill.

As you can see in the photo below, it doesn't matter that the tailstock end of the log is at an angle to the turning axis. With normal pressure from the tailstock, I can start the lathe, adjust the speed, and turn a good tenon on the tailstock end of the workpiece. Then I will reverse the piece, mount the tenon in a scroll chuck, and complete the rest of the turning in my usual manner.

Safety is always a primary consideration. I wouldn't use this friction drive for very large pieces, nor would I put a great deal of side pressure against the workpiece from a lathe chisel, especially near the headstock end. Following these guidelines, I have never had a piece come loose when I am cutting the tenon with this friction drive. I am now much more likely to start a rough-cut turning blank using the friction drive or a screw chuck, rather than starting between centers.

Beginner's Turn-10 Essential Items

There are over 50 variables at play in any woodturning project. From design and form to finishing. Not all of these have to be chosen every time you walk up to the lathe to do something but there are 10 such items that in my opinion must be checked every time I walk up to my lathe and start turning. Especially if it has been 4 hours or more between sessions. Your mind can change considerably and circumstances or intent may have changed completely.

- 1. Make sure the power switch is OFF and check that the speed dial/knob is at ZERO before turning on the lathe and turning up the spindle speed (assuming one has a variable speed lathe) to start turning on a new project or after 4 or more hours.
- 2. Double check the attachment of the wood project to the lathe. If a continuing project, check the tightness of the chuck if one is in use.
- 3. Check to make sure the Tailstock is locked to the bedways if in use.
- 4. If the Tailstock is in use, make sure the Quill and live center is contacting the wood the way you want them to.

 Check the Quill Lock status if this is important.
- 5. Select Tool Are you sure this is still the Tool that is going to do something wonderful?
- 6. Toolrest Look the Toolrest over and make sure it is the correct one for the job (length) and the tool you are using. Clear it of any debris from previous turnings. Make sure to lock the Banjo and Toorest.
- 7. Toolrest Height Always check this adjustment and make sure that the tool you chose above is at the appropriate height with respect to the wood and the use of the tool.
- 8. Check to make sure the Bedways are clear of tools and other things that might hit the wood or other spinning lathe attachments before turning on the lathe.
- 9. Turn the wood on the spindle with the lathe off to check the position of the Toolrest to make sure the wood clears the Toolrest and anything else close at hand.
- 10. Focus your mind on the task at hand. Pay attention to what you are doing with that lathe running at 2000 rpm and you have a razor sharp tool in your hand.

 ALWAYS WEAR THE APPROPRIATE SAFETY

If everything is A-OK above, have fun with your lathe!!! EQUIPMENT - That should be number one!!

Brain Tease - Answers

- 2. What caused all the end grain cracking? I turned the outside first then had to leave town so the inside sat unturned for 3 days. I believe that unequal tension caused severe cracking.
- 3. Any guess as to how the cracks were repaired? Was that "the right stuff?" Thick CA glue...I had a somewhat outdated bottle so I used it up...lots!
- 4. What was the moisture content? 8%
- 5. Do you agree with the decision to further turn this cracked blank? The picture on the right reveals that I did indeed further turn it! I did indeed decide to "rescue" turn the bowl, and had a decent outcome with no safety issues.







Making Christmas Gnomes (or for any occasion)

I love making gnomes! A quick easy project that brings a chuckle to me and always elicits positive, fun responses from the recipients. There is always a limb or a chunk of wood just right for one of these babies. Getting started is fun too if you watch Nick Zammeti on You Tube, he's hilarious and crazy anyway and loves "Gahnomes" as he affectionately calls them.

I have included a high tech diagram for turning these. Rough turn to round then turn a dovetail tenon for chucking, then begin the shaping process as described in the diagram. I really like long pointy hats and then top it off with a 1/2" ball that I paint usually red or green. You can place the ball in a bench vise with wooden faces and drill a small hole then CA the ball on top after painting. The Woodpeckers Store sells them on Amazon.

I drill a small hole for the nose while still on the lathe about 1/4" down from the hat bottom. I use cribbage pegs which are available in fun colors, again on Amazon from the Mudder Store.

Finally, I love the beards sold by Janeizit on Etsy. 10 various shades of beard for \$10. Poke a hole with a scratch awl for the nose then CA glue the beard down to the body. This can get a little tricky as some seeps through the beard material but it usually works out just fine.



Attached you will see the group I made for friends last Christmas. I would warn you that you should isolate these fellas whenever possible, as they tend to be quite mischievous when left to linger in a group...they are Gnomes after all!



Why Turn Practice Pieces?

Practice pieces are one of my favorite things to do when I am lucky enough to get my hands on green wood, especially wood I've never turned before and enough of it to play around with. Wood turning is my hobby and I do it mostly for my own pleasure and satisfaction, gifts for family and friends and rarely sell anything I make. I think, because of this approach to wood turning, I'm not always concerned with the functionality, beauty or marketability of a piece. I just want to see how a piece of wood turns, what it looks like, how it warps and cracks so I can get an idea of what I can do with it. Of course, this same information is invaluable to the production turner and those building an inventory of sale items. You can read about how and why walnut is a preferred wood to turn but actually turning a piece of walnut is where the learning begins. I have been pleasantly surprised by some wood and totally frustrated by others but I always learn something about the wood and about my turning abilities.

I took a 12" unfinished, plain catalpa platter to the July, New Mexico Wood Turners meeting and immediately ran into Kay Grant who was taking photos of pieces that others had brought to the meeting. All but mine were beautifully turned and finished, one segmented piece had taken months to complete. Kay grabbed it, photographed it and I lost track of it only to realize later that it was going to be presented to the NMWT members with those other pieces that had been photographed. When my platter was presented, I explained it was a practice piece to see what the green catalpa would do as far as warping and cracking as it dried.

I've never worked with catalpa and acquired the wood for the platter through a friend of Patricia Apt's and, I must say, I felt green wood rich! Large rounds, only a couple of days after the tree had been cut down, that appeared to have beautifully figured grain and chatoyancy. Green catalpa wood is light in color, has a slightly musty but pleasantly fruity odor and does not appear to crack badly if sealed quickly after removing the pith. So far, so good but I had yet to put a chisel to it. Finally getting a it on the lathe and turning the flat blank became a lesson in tear-out and shredding.

The orientation of the grain of the blank was partly responsible. The blank was essentially the center plank section, which included the pith, that I had removed from a large round to get two nice sized bowl blanks. The grain was fairly straight but the growth rings were looping around the center pith and emerging from the surface I was attempting to smooth. This was the most troublesome area of the platter. I tried my entire arsenal of bowl gouges, sharpening, resharpening and spinning as

fast as possible. I tried every scraper I own, but this wood was challenging! I learned a lot about this wood and my patience. I roughed out the platter and gave it a few hours with a fan blowing on it before going back to try again. It was drying rapidly and not warping too badly, so I was able to make some progress on scraping off some of the torn grain. However, there remained a significant amount of damage, so I started in with the ole "60 grit bowl gouge". I was able to sand out the damage about as fast as the wood was drying so did not encounter very much of the sandpaper becoming bound up with wet fibers, which can lead to burnishing rather than sanding. I frequently blew air on it with my compressor which helped dry the surface fibers for sanding. Keeping the platter thin, ~3/8", also helped to speed the drying process. I had the platter sanded to the point where I could finish it off with a single coat of Myland's Friction Polish to now help slow the drying process.

Although I was able to get a nice smooth surface while the platter was still mostly wet, the same source of all that tear-out resulted in an interesting surface texture after it had dried completely. The softer portion of each growth ring interval tore-out more and of course shrank down below the firmer portion of each growth ring as it dried. I think this gave the platter a pleasing texture that would sand out if unwanted in the final piece. I have found that the dried catalpa is somewhat soft and will mar easily. It could be used as a charcuterie board but expect marks from metal utensils. The wood did maintain a nice light color and did not turn the dingy gray color some people have complained about. I don't know if this would hold true if turned dry but I'm looking forward to finding out.

Every time we place a piece of wood on our lathes, we are essentially conducting an experiment. None of us can totally predict how the finished piece will turn out. I frequently change my original design for a piece when I find that the wood is taking me in another direction. Taking the time to practice or experiment with wood you are unfamiliar with, especially green wood, can be worth the time and effort in several ways. Obviously, you get a feel for how the wood turns, whether or not it will crack or check as you turn it and as it dries, how it will warp, how it sands and how different finishes will look. I have even been pleasantly surprised to have a practice piece turn out so well that it ends up on my "keeper" shelf, where the platter now sits.






