
Dec 2022

The Gift Exchange Process

Everyone is asked to please bring one or more "gifts" to the December meeting. The gift should be something related to wood turning. It can be a tool, a book, a piece of wood, a finished wood turning, CD/DVD, or anything else related to turning. All the "gifts" will be placed on tables in the front of the room. Everyone who comes to the meeting, including guests, will be given a ticket as they arrive and the ticket stubs will be placed in a bowl. When the exchange begins, we'll start drawing ticket stubs from the bowl. As each ticket stub is drawn the person holding the number comes to the front and claims any one of the gifts, as desired. The process is repeated until all stubs have been drawn. As the stubs are drawn, they are kept in a second container. Do not discard your ticket after you've claimed your gift.

If additional gifts remain, the drawing process starts again with all the stubs that have been held and continues until all the gifts have been claimed. It's possible that additional rounds may be required if a large number of gifts have been brought by members.

So... dig through your shop (no need to purchase gifts unless you wish to) and find something cool to gift.

Guns to Gardens

I met with the Board Chair for Robert F. Kennedy Charter School (RFKCS) and they are starting up a new non-profit program entitled Guns to Gardens. The primary objective is to get illegal guns off the street, and the effort will initially be focused on the South Valley of Albuquerque in particular, and New Mexico in general. I will be learning more about this but in a nutshell, they are collecting illegal guns (for a \$150 gift certificate), and melting the metal parts down to make garden tools. The rifle stocks will be used to make handles for the tools.

The program, from a tool-making point of view, will have two parts: the forge for working the metal parts and a wood shop for the handles. They are looking for a forge for the metal working, and they have just about all they need in the wood shop except a lathe and associated tooling, and something with which to sharpen the wood-turning tools.

The secondary objective is to get "kids" off the street and into a program that teaches them a trade, and or related skills and techniques in woodworking and forge working.

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Reflections from Last Month

November's meeting featured Rick Judd demonstrating how to turn a bottle stopper. Rick has been turning bottle stoppers over 15 years and he passed on many great tips and tricks he's learned. Rick says bottle stoppers aren't just for wine but are great for other bottled beverages such as tequila or beer.

Rick began by reminding us of the importance of safety and to protect the eyes, ears and lungs. He also had many recommendations for bottle stoppers and hardware, finishing products and methods, and where to find them. Rick talked about 3 techniques for making bottle stoppers.



First the No-hardware No-thread technique

For this method you need an appropriately sized wood blank (2x2x4 or greater), a cork and short piece of ½" diameter dowel. Rick uses a drill press to drill a hole in the cork, sized to fit the dowel. Rick doesn't put the blank between centers to turn a tenon to fit in the jaws. Instead, he mounts the square blank in a four jaws chuck and brings the live center to the other end. Rick uses a bowl gouge to round the blank close to the jaws, and because the blank is small, he turns at a fast speed. He uses the wing of the bowl gouge to get a smooth sheer cut. Once the piece is round he removes the tail stock, mounts a Jacobs chuck in the tail stock and drills a hole in the base. One end of the dowel is glued into the hole. Now the piece can be turned around and the dowel is the tenon that will be mounted in a chuck with the smaller #1 jaws. Once the piece is shaped, sanded and finished the cork can be glued onto the tenon



The second technique requires a worm screw

This method is begun similar to the first method. Rick mounted a square blank in the chuck jaws, rounded most of the piece using a bowl gouge with the lathe running at a fast speed. He used the wing of the bowl gouge to get a smooth sheer cut. Once the piece is round he removed the tail stock and used a parting tool to true the end flat. Rick sanded the end smooth using 180 grit sand paper glued to a small flat board. Make sure the end is flat or slightly concave so it sits firmly against the metal of the bottle stopper. Then a Jacobs chuck was mounted in the tail stock and a hole was drilled into the bottom of the piece. The size of the drill bit should be slightly smaller than the worm screw, depending on the hardness of the wood. He removed the Jacobs chuck from the tail stock and removed the blank from the

chuck. Rick then set a worm screw in the chuck, took a spacer that he has designed and placed it so it sits flat against the jaws. The piece is then screwed onto the worm screw and the tail stock brought up for support. These spacers are about $2 \frac{1}{2}$ " in diameter and are designed to sit flat against the jaws and keep the piece in line with the spindle. It has a hole in the middle that fits over the worm screw and an approx. $\frac{3}{4}$ " short tenon that puts a little space between the piece and the spacer. This tenon is the same or slightly smaller diameter than the base of the bottle stopper.

Rick then screwed the piece onto the worm screw and brought the tail stock up for support. He then finished turning the piece with the bowl gouge to its final shape. He then sanded and finished the piece with CA glue. Once the piece was finished he could twist it onto the threaded end of the steel bottle stopper.

The third technique is similar the second technique but uses a mandrel

The process begins the same as the first two techniques up to the point where a hole is drilled in the base. With the square end still mounted in the chuck jaws, place the Jacobs chuck in the tail stock and drill a hole in the base. For this method the size of the drill bit should be slightly smaller than the 5/16 by 10 thread tap, depending on the hardness of the wood. Then mount the tap in the Jacobs chuck and with the lathe off, turn the tap by hand to create the threads inside the hole.



Then remove the chuck and set the bottle stopper mandrel on the lathe spindle. The mandrel comes with a nylon spacer but Rick uses one he made out of wood to properly fit the depth of the hole in the base of the piece. The piece was then screwed onto the mandrel and the piece was turned to its final shape, sanded and then finished.



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A variation of this method is to use a stainless-steel insert. In this case a 7/16" hole was drilled in the base. Then the insert is glued into the hole. Rick recommends polyurethane gorilla glue (or any clear urethane glue that does not expand) to glue in the insert. Put just enough glue to joint the insides and leave a little room at the end so the insert doesn't get pushed out. Leave it to dry overnight. The piece is then screwed onto the mandrel and turned to its final shape, sanded and then finished.



Finishing

Rick applies a CA glue finish to his bottle stoppers. He prefers Parfix 3408 CA glue as it has a longer set time. You can also use what ever finish you're comfortable with as long as it is foodsafe, such as Mahoney's Walnut oil, and water resistant. If you wait several days after using Mahoney's Walnut oil you can finish the pieces with CA glue. Rick uses Vonax polishing compound to get a final finish.

Women in Turning



For November's meeting the WIT women met at Bill Zerby's house on Sunday the 20th. Bill had been our guest speaker at the October meeting and had offered to host us at his shop for more sharpening instruction. We were happy to take him up on his offer and welcomed the opportunity for more hands.

Bill began by showing us many of the tools that he has made himself and assured us that we too, could make our own tools. He brought out metal bar stock and rods of various alloys and described the metallurgic properties of each. He gave a very informative overview of what happens to the metal alloys during the annealing, quenching and tempering process.





He showed us how to sharpen a skew on a grinder equipped with CBN wheels, and how to use a 600 grit honing card for a quick sharpen. He demonstrated on a bowl turning how the skew can be used as a negative rake scraper.

Bill has two Wolverine Vari-Grind jigs, one setup for a spindle gouge and one set up for a bowl gouge. He used his Wolverine set up to demonstrate sharpening a bowl gouge.

The afternoon passed quickly and there is probably more that we could have covered. Bill says we're welcome to come back any time and I'm sure we will.

A big Thank You to Bill Zerby for welcoming us into his shop and generously giving his time and expertise to our WIT group.

So now you have gone through all the steps that everyone else always talks about. You have a lathe, woodturning tools, chucks and everything else needed to turn wood. You have decided on a project, procured a wonderful looking blank, looked at 5,243 YTube videos, decided on a design AND FINALLY you actually touched a wood shaping tool to a piece of wood and so began your journey into woodturning for real!!! Congratulations!! Now what?

By now it must have become apparent that this Art and Craft is just a little more complex and challenging than you might

have thought. Getting that perfect shape, totally smooth surface, all the design features totally perfect is a real challenge and a lifelong affair between you and the wood and the craft of woodturning. And you haven't even touched the most challenging part of the deal in my opinion, and that is finishing. And finishing is important. Observe how people approach and consider a piece of turned wood. They want to touch it, look at it, glide their fingers across it. It is as if they are forming a relationship with the wood on the spot! And other than the visual aesthetics, it is the touch and feel of the piece that is important.

How do you get the touch and feel that you want the observer to experience? Obviously with the tools that you bring to bear on the wood but after that then what? The actual surface of the wood responds to tools in various different ways depending on the type of wood, type and sharpness of the tool, and the experience level of the woodturner. Not everyone has 10,000 hours of turning experience, has turned 20,000 bowls/pens/scoops etc etc. Even those artisans struggle with surface finishes. So what do you do as a beginner after you have exhausted all of your tool techniques and the surface of the wood is still not smooth enough, there are edges that don't quite look right, tool marks that just won't go away? This is where SANDING comes into play.

There is nothing inherently bad about sanding despite what all the experts and pundits have to say about it. There are thousands of YTubers and experts of all types out there that swear they HATE sanding. Waste of time and MONEY. These people will not blink at spending eight grand on a lathe but don't want to spend 50 cents on a piece of sandpaper? Well folks, sometimes, sanding is the only way to get the final product or piece that you want to achieve.

Sanding is a tool, nothing more and nothing less. As usual, with anything related to wood, there are hundreds of different options to sanding, from a simple piece of sandpaper that fits in your hand to a three thousand dollar drum sander just to get all those 3,564 segments you just cut to be perfectly smooth and straight so that you can glue them together to create the winning vase at the State Fair.

Start simple.

Go to your favorite big box store and buy a selection of sandpaper sheets for wood. It should include grits (the actual abrasive roughness of the paper) from 80 to 400, include 120, 240, and 320 as well. Not many people go above 400 but 600 and 800 is useful at times. Acrylic pens require as high as 3200 and beyond. Experiment with those sheets on your turnings. Take a practice piece of wood and sand it with the various grits until the surface is what you want it to be. Don't be afraid to use the stuff, treat it as if it is free. Of course it isn't but

always using fresh sandpaper will improve your muscle memory for what kind of consistent result you can get with it. Be aware that different woods respond differently to sanding. Try sanding on a scrap piece before using it on that \$200 blank you just spent 100 hours turning!!! Try different brands and styles of paper.



There is even power sanding that you can get into. I probably have 5 different styles and types of sanding materials and equipment that I use frequently, and I am just a beginner. I couldn't produce what I have done without sanding. You will quickly find out what works and don't let all the opinions out there sway what you will eventually find out for yourself and your work.

As a result of your experience and gaining of knowledge of sanding, your pieces will look better, feel better, and take the eventual finish that you apply at the end of the project better. You will have a stunning piece of art to be proud of.

Finishing is next folks, and that article will be for the record books.

Membership Renewal

Membership Dues

Membership dues renewals are due on or before the last day of the month in which the member's current membership term expires. 
