Steel yourself for New Mexico Woodturners' meeting on May 7

We will demonstrate sharpening systems for your turning tools. Are you keen on minimizing tearout on end-grain? A sharp tool is critical. Want to impress the judges at State Fair? The judges look at the quality of your finish, and using sharp tools will give you a competitive edge.

Our demonstrators will bring different sharpening systems, and show you how they sharpen their tools using these sharpening systems. You don't need a fancy sharpening jig—but the jigs will reduce the amount of material that you grind away when you sharpen.

We will have a conventional "slow speed" bench grinder, and the OneWay jig setup. We will also have a Tormek system (that's really slow speed, compared with the slow speed bench grinder).

This demonstration will show sharpening of:

Spindle gouge **Parting tool** (Negative rake) scraper Bowl gouge Skew (including honing of the skew)

We'll also discuss grinding wheels, and some discussion of tool steel. Come join us! We promise not a single dull moment!

Reflections from Last Month's Meeting

Indexing & Carving

Our first meeting back in person we got a chance to see how indexing and carving your pieces enhances your turning. Using these methods you can make an extremely complicated time consuming piece or add just a few accents. Indexing gives you a nice symmetrical grid to add your design and ensure it fits on your piece just right. Carving allows you to go from just round to "how was that done?"

We saw that our lathes come with some basic level of indexing system, but for best flexibility you need a jig. There are professional jigs out there as show by John Ellis and then for us cheaper folk homemade indexing jigs. However you decide to go and indexing jig expands your horizons.

There are many options out there if you want to carve your pieces. You can carve with simple hand tools or jump to power carving. Use your dremel, a micro motor, a dental tool, a die grinder or other tool. Oh by the way, the burrs for these tools come in nearly endless sizes and shapes.

See what you can make with indexing and carving, we all want to see your enhanced pieces.

AAW Membership Application

WIT (Women in Turning) is "dedicated to encouraging and assisting women in their pursuit of turning, sharing ideas and processes to further member's skills and creativity, and increasing participation of women in the field of woodturning."

The AAW WIT Committee agrees that to further this mission, we can work with chapters to help grow the number of women in AAW. Currently, women comprise less the 9% of AAW membership.



To encourage women to join AAW, the WIT Committee offers a limited number of WIT sponsored half price AAW memberships to women for a one-year, full "General" AAW membership.

<u>Eligibility</u> To be eligible, a grant recipient must be a woman and who has never previously been a member of AAW.

<u>Process</u> Only the chapter AAW WIT Liaison, Kay Grant and Sally Breeden, chapter president or vice-president may request the grant. After we've received the application, the recipient will be sent a promotional code with instructions on how to use the code in applying for an AAW membership. If you have questions, please email wit@woodturner.org.

Limitations

If the nominee is a <u>new member</u> of a local chapter (within the last two months), WIT will pay 100% of the AAW membership.

If the nominee <u>has been a member</u> of a local chapter for more than two months, WIT will pay 50% of the AAW membership.

If the nominee is not a member of a local chapter, WIT will pay 50% of the AAW membership.

Grants are currently limited to no more than two women, per chapter, per quarter.

Quarters end January 31, April 30, July 31, and October 31. Based on the number of requests, this limitation may change.

We hope that this offer will be an incentive for new women woodturners to join your chapter.

Bowl from a Board (BFAB)

Hello fellow club members. I watched Kay and Bert Grant's demo on the BFAB (Bowl from a Board) and enjoyed it very much (I tried it soon after and they made it look easier than it is (a)). Anyway, I have found a lot of YouTube videos on this topic with different approaches, including cutting the half-rings, such as demonstrated by Kay and Bert, as well as leaving the board blank whole, and not having to cut the blank in half (no bandsaw necessary), and not having to glue the halves once cut. One of the YouTubers who has some creative problem-solving approaches for this type of turning (among many other types of turning) is Gary Ascher, a.k.a. ThePapa1947 on YouTube.

The primary reason I am writing to you is because of a couple of jigs Gary has created that appear to make the process of turning the BFAB potentially easier and less involved than necessary with the half rings and bandsaw method. He has created two jigs - one of which requires sophisticated machining, but the other jig can be a DIY for most of us woodturners. Both jigs allow you to cut the BFAB, from a solid board blank, while keeping it on the lathe. Gary is an excellent teacher, with effective and efficient videos, and I do recommend his content (no relationship and no sponsorship between us).

"New To Me" – The Oneway #2 MT Screw Chuck

I was introduced to a screw chuck early in my turning education—a lump of steel 3" in diameter, with a 3/8" x 1 %" screw to embed in the turning blank. My first screw chuck threaded onto the lathe spindle; I have another version that is held in the jaws of a scroll chuck. This design works well for the early steps in turning a bowl, and for some other medium-sized projects, although the length and diameter of the

screw and the chuck body don't work for some projects.

When Dawn and I decided to turn new wooden knobs for all the cabinet doors and drawers in our kitchen, a challenge was figuring out how to hold the small turning blanks securely, while allowing the needed access to the turning tools. It wasn't obvious to me how to hold the workpiece for efficient turning of both ends and the side profile, without leaving any marks on the finished knob. I never considered my screw chucks, since they were much too large for this project.

Luckily, turning instructor and NMWT member Michael Mocho suggested the Oneway #2 MT [Morse Taper] Screw Chuck. I had never seen one before, and Oneway's name for it gives no hint that it is significantly different from other screw chucks that I knew. However, this is not your junior high shop class's screw chuck. The first picture (Diagram 1) shows my big, old screw chuck next to the svelt, disassembled Oneway screw chuck. Next to the #2 MT tapered and threaded chuck body is a red ¼" Square Drive/Robertson driver bit; the shortened 10-24 screw that I used for turning the knobs; and the threaded brass cap nut that holds everything together.

The second photo (Diagram 2) shows the Oneway screw chuck reassembled, with my knob-turning screw on the left side of the picture. The brass cap nut is about an inch in diameter. This nut threads onto a steel #2 Morse Taper body, which encapsulates a magnetized socket for the ½" driver bit of your choice, and space for a variety of screw heads. My chuck came with two sizes of Phillips bits, two square drive bits, a Torx, and a Posi-Drive, as shown on the right side of the photo; but you can use any ½" drive bit and several screw types, lengths, and diameters up to #10 (or more, if you are willing to drill out your chuck's brass nut). I haven't tried the aluminum disk that comes with the chuck package, for projects needing a larger diameter support surface.

We had already decided to attach our knobs using #10-24 threaded rod in the knobs, and threaded inserts in the drawers and cabinet doors. I mounted a #2 square-drive bit in the screw chuck, along with stainless steel screw that I shortened to protrude about 5/8" beyond the brass nut.

"New To Me" – The Oneway #2 MT Screw Chuck

Turning about fifty knobs, including cutting fifty short lengths of threaded rod for the knobs, suggested the need for finding an efficient processes. The picture below (Diagram 3) shows some of the tools I used.

I cut the threaded rod with a shear, which damaged a few threads on one side of the cut. I used a stationary belt sander with a 120 grit belt to remove most of the damaged threads. However, each piece still needed some help to true up the final turns of the thread. I found that by spinning a threading die onto the threaded rod stock *before* making the cut, I could quickly repair the last threads by partially

unthreading the die past the rod's end, and cutting away or aligning any small pieces of bent threads.

As you can see in the cut-away example of a knob, we threaded the turning blanks with a machinist's 10-24 tap, to accept the pieces of threaded rod. The picture shows the tap in a standard T-handle, but we quickly found that it was easier to mount workpiece in a scroll chuck on the lathe, and hold the tap in a Jacobs drill chuck mounted in the tail stock. To cut the threads, we turned the scroll chuck with the left hand, while using the right hand to press the tailstock-held tap into the previously drilled hole in the knob blank, as the lathe spindle and blank was rotated by hand. This went pretty quickly.

I had some doubts about whether the threads cut into the wooden blanks would have enough strength to withstand the stresses of turning. I was pleased to find that the strength was more than sufficient. Not even one knob in our set of about fifty failed through overstressing the wooden threads. Before turning, I had applied a few drops of thin CA adhesive to the wooden threads, so this produced a stronger composite. I let the CA cure overnight before I began to turn each knob. We used a dense wood for the knobs, Bolivian rosewood.

The next picture (Diagram 4) shows a knob blank on the lathe, mounted on the screw chuck, and supported by a revolving center in the tail stock. The Oneway screw chuck, combined with a Nova revolving center and a Robust tool rest reveals that we run an ecumenical woodshop.

I rounded the top edge of the knob (at the tail stock), and marked the key measurements for the knob's proportions (see Diagram 5).

"New To Me" – The Oneway #2 MT Screw Chuck

The small diameter of the screw chuck, and the separation from the lathe spindle that it provides, allowed me to shape the knob's profile with my normal parting tools, bowl gouges, and spindle gouges, rather than needing miniature or specialty tools. As you can see in Diagram 6, the knob blanks were not mounted in spindle orientation, but cross-grain, as a bowl would be.

One of the unexpected advantages of using this screw chuck revealed itself when I parted off the knob. The screw in the chuck is threaded into the knob well past the point where I parted it off. Instead of risking having the knob fly across the room, I cut with a 1/16" parting tool, until I could see the gleam of the threaded screw. The screw was still supporting the now-separated knob, to the right of the parting cut. I stopped the lathe, and unscrewed the almost-finished knob from the screw chuck. A little sanding on the bottom of the knob finished the turning.

The final picture (Diagram 7) shows two knobs with a view of one of the carved designs on the top of the knob, and the bottom of another knob with the threaded rod and threaded insert. The 'silver' bead in the knob is a stainless-steel ball bearing. Dawn carved unique flower patterns on every knob, creating different flower species for the different drawer and door groups.

As I mentioned earlier, I had no idea that this style of screw chuck existed. Having used it to make about fifty knobs, I like it a lot. I think it will be useful to me for a number of smaller projects. The screw chuck also comes with a small faceplate option, which I have not tried. The list price is just over \$100, at the moment. We ordered ours from Long Island Woodworking Supply for about \$10 less. I've ordered from this company before, and I am a satisfied customer.



Membership Dues

Membership dues renewals are due on or before the last day of the month in which the member's current membership term expires. 


