Turning and Carving Voronoi Pattern Bowl - Michael Andersen

This demonstration will cover turning a shallow

bowl and drawing the voronoi (turtle shell/crac ked mud) pattern on



the bowl. Michael will also demonstrate how to make your own wood burner tips from nichrome wire, the use of a wood burner to cut your pattern, the use of hand and rotary carving to bring the pattern to life, and various forms of texturing to finish off the project.

It's August 2018! Remember that we now meet at the <u>new club</u> <u>meeting location</u>, at North Domingo Baca Multigenerational Center (NDBMGC), 7521 Carmel NE, Albuquerque NM. The doors open at 9:00am, and the meeting

will run from 9:30am to 12:30pm.

To get to NDBMGC: From Paseo Del Norte, go to Wyoming. Turn North on Wyoming to Carmel, turn left on Carmel, then, take the second driveway to the right into the parking lot for NDBMGC. Currently, our meeting room is at the NE end of the building on the first floor. We're still working out the various kinks of the new location. For now, please don't enter the meeting room at 9:00am (unless you would like to volunteer to help set up the lathe and the A/V equipment). We do need to get a "regular" set-up crew put together. Talk to Shane Yost and Derek Roff if you'd like to be part of the set-up crew; Shane for now is setting up the lathe, and Derek is setting up A/V. We'll be setting up the photographer for your pieces outside the meeting room. Please don't just hand him the piece and walk away. Sign up your piece and make sure the photo gets taken in the correct order! Remember to sign up for state fair too! Bill Mantelli will have sign-up sheets. We would like to have volunteers to demonstrate turning (you need to be a member of AAW to demonstrate turning at state fair for insurance purposes). We also would like volunteers to help play the various club videos and talk with our visitors. We also need volunteers to help check entries in (and out), judge entries, and the lathe moving crew, I'm sure, would also love to have some help. The state fair is one of the club's biggest activities. It is very rewarding to give simple turnings to your audience; to see the visitors admiring our work, and it is good to receive critiques on the pieces that you enter. Please volunteer to participate in state fair!

Talking about being a member of AAW (the American Association of Woodturners), I highly recommend you join. Visit www.woodturner.org for more details. Here's a video tip about personal protective equipment (PPE) from the AAW: https://vimeo.com/266004735

Talking about safety: We want all of you to turn long into the future, with all your external organs (fingers, toes, eyes, etc.) and internal organs (lungs, liver, kidneys, etc.) in good shape. Sanding is an activity that we all do (well, maybe some of our really skilled members are able to

turn without sanding, but not me!). I like to do the following things when sanding: (1) Wear a dust mask (at minimum, a N95 dust mask) or respirator, (2) have your dust collector running, (3) move your tool rest out of the way so you don't trap your fingers, (4) change your speed to slow, and (5) don't wrap the sandpaper around the workpiece!

Our demonstrator for August is Michael Andersen. He'll be demonstrating what I call his "turtle shell" bowls (and what he calls Voronoi pattern). I'm looking forward to an outstanding demonstration!

JULY 2018 PRESENTATION: ITEMS FOR STATE FAIR

The following items were demonstrated: **Bottle stoppers, by John Ellis.**

John showed two types of wine bottle stoppers. One is wood with a silicone sleeve, and the second type uses a threaded metal insert. The threaded insert type requires drilling a hole using a 23/64" hole before tapping the threads with the insert.

The wine stopper using the silicon sleeve is simplest since the shaft can be turned and the top can be shaped to suit. All this can be done without removing the piece from the lathe until it is completely finished.

The threaded insert type is a bit more involved. The stainless stopper inserts are available from a variety of sources: Ruth Niles, Craft Supplies, and Penn State Industries.

John demonstrated with a 1 ½ square x 4" long piece, already turned round. For the fair, the audience loves to see square turned to round. John then used a bedan, and made a peeling cut to get a 12mm diameter for the silicon sleeve to fit. Be sure the long 12 mm tenon is not too long. After turning and sanding, John recommends applying 3 coats of lacquer.


Patricia Apt demonstrated turning finials. She started by rounding a piece of maple to 1 ½"


diameter. She cut beads and coves and completed the finial. She made a flame-shaped piece by turning a flat section at the bottom of the piece, then, shaped the flame after removing the tail stock. The flame was shaped using a 3/8" bowl gouge and the finishing cuts were done with a 3/8" spindle gouge.

Hy Tran demonstrated a loose-fit lidded box. Hy says:

I learned this (among with a bunch of other spindle items) in a 1-day spindle class with Nick Cook, when I was passing thru Georgia. Nick says this box is inspired by Yann Marot's boxes. Not counting the time to prep the blank and mount it in a chuck, it takes me about 20 minutes to turn a box like this. The tools you're going to use are a spindle gouge and a parting tool. Additional tools you might use are a scraper and a skew.

You'll want a spindle blank that's longer than both box and lid. Round the blank and cut a tenon for a chuck; mount the blank in the chuck. Turn a large bead and face the end of the bead smooth. Then, turn a small recess with a square end.







Hollow the inside of your box, leaving a ledge. Sand if desired, then, part your box.

Turn a tenon to have a loose diameter fit on the opening of the box. Pay attention to avoid tearout (get close to your diameter using a scraper and finish the tenon with a spindle gouge). Turn a cylinder that's the diameter of your tenon, to about the length you want for your lid (including knob or finial).

Finish the underside of your lid so it's clean (remove the tearout from parting off your box). Mark the cylinder to get a maximum thickness for your lid (it's better to have the lid sit a bit under the top of the box), then, turn the knob or finial. Be careful as the lid knob or finial diameter gets small. Sand and finish carefully, then, part the lid.





Bill Zerby demonstrated turning a top and doing hair sticks (hair pins).

Bill emphasized the importance of the bevel on the tool before initiating the cut. For the top, he demonstrated some chatter (low speed on the lathe, tool handle high and tool touching the work low, at about the 7 o'clock position). Small diameter handles make the top spin easier. For the hair pins/sticks, turn a long and slender cylinder using pin jaws. Decorate the end at the headstock with some beads and coves. Taper the end at the tail stock. Sand as needed; part the pointy end at the tail stock; then, carefully turn the pin off the headstock.
