There are still a few spots left (mostly evening), so if you want to join in this enjoyable pastime, add your name to the list at the meeting this Saturday. Remember, you are not demonstrating your talent and ability, you are demonstrating the magic and fun of turning wood to people who know nothing about it – especially kids! (If you make a mistake, who's going to know?)

The September meeting's demo will be on Photographing Your Work. This will assist those of us who hope to market our pieces, as well as those who simply want to keep a record of their progress.

AUGUST 5 PRESENTATION:

State Fair Project Demos

Scott Eckstein - Mushrooms

- "Do something that you're proficient with and have fun"
- Start with a cylinder mounted in a chuck
- From the unsupported end, begin to shape the top such as Curved, cone shaped, etc
- Shape the stem
- Part off the base.

Words of counsel for those who will be demonstrating at this year's fair, "Have fun and try to impart some information to all who are watching"

Drake Ward ... Small Boxes

"I don't make grain matched boxes"

Box 1 - Bottom first

- Start with 2x2, turn a tenon and then turn it round while mounted n the chuck
- Use Jacobs chuck with 1 5/8 Forster bit and drill into the end of the cylinder to a depth about 11/4"
- Cut out the dimple in the bottom of the box with a round edged scraper
- Use a skew to angle the top edge of the box bottom so that when closed, the top will rest on just a thin section of the outer rim.

This keeps the appearance of the joining sections very tight

- Part off the bottom of the box. Make sure to cut beyond the bottom of the box or you'll end up with napkin rings.

Now make the top

- Make the tenon on the end of the remaining piece in the chuck
- Use a skew to cut a taper in the top rim so that the top and bottom will have a tight fit
- Use a jig or calipers to cut the diameter of the tenon 1.5/8"
- Use round nosed scraper to make a shallow indentation in the top
- Part off the top
- Sand top and bottom using 80 grit sandpaper mounted to a small piece of plywood

Box 2 - Top First

- Same starting procedure as above ... Drill hole depth only 1/4 inch
- Use skew to taper out rim
- Use round edge scraper to cut dome in the lid and remove divit from the Forster bit tip
- Part off the top
- Cut a tenon to match to inside of the top (1 5/8")
- Check the fit
- Use skew to cut taper in top rim of the box bottom
- Change drill bits to 1½" and drill out the bottom
- depth about 1"
- Part of the bottom
- Sand top and bottom

Boxes can be used for rings, ear-rings, pills (tighter fitting lid), tooth fairy, or ????

<u>Ray Berry</u> ... Flower pots, sometimes hollowed, use flower insert

- Start with cylinder mounted in a chuck
- True up the cylinder, about 1 1/2 diameter
- Use Jacobs chuck with 3/8" bit and drill into the end, about 1"
- Used mustard squeeze bottle as air pump to blow out the inside. Or you can use a straw
- Use your favorite hollowing tool to hollow out the inside
- Turn the outer shape while using the tail stock to support the piece
- Make sure you don't cut through the bottom
- Remove tail stock and shape and clean up the top
- Sand exterior while Turning
- Use favorite chattering tool to create a pattern on the outside
- Highlight the chatterwork by outlining with the 3-point tool
- Turn speed up and use card board or thin wood to burn in the highlight
- Use lemon oil finish (food safe and nonallergenic) available from Craft Supplies
- Part off the bottom and sand off the nib Done

Patricia Apt ... Tea Lights

- Start with about 3-4 inch diameter round blank mounted in a chuck
- Glued smaller diameter piece as the tenon to mount to the chuck
- Use bowl gouge and true up the cylinder
- The tail stock end will be the top
- Make a pencil line about 1/3 of the way back from the top
- Tea light hole is $1\frac{1}{2}$ " diameter so mark that as well on the top face
- Start at the high point (line) and start shaping the top of the bowl towards the top face.
- Don't worry about the very center because it will be drilled out when you make the hole for the tea light
- Now start at the high point and shape the lower portion of the bowl.

- The chuck will prevent going all the way to the bottom face. That will be shaped after the piece has been drilled and reverse mounted.
- Measure the tea light, they are sometimes different sizes. Patricia's was just under $1\frac{1}{2}$ " thus she used $1\frac{1}{2}$ " Forster bit.
- -Drill the hole in the top just deep enough to contain the light
- Sand the outer shape and inside edge of the hole
- Remove from the chuck
- Replace chuck with one that has needle nose jaws. This is used in the expansion mode to hold the piece in place from the top
- Attach the piece, now with the top towards the head stock using the chuck
- Bring up the tail stock for additional safety and stability
- Finish shaping the bottom of the piece and turn off the sacrifical the tenon that was glued on.
- Retract the tail stock and finish turning of the tenon and final shape to the bottom of the piece.
- Turn decorative design into the base, i.e., concentric rings into a concave bottom
- Finish sand the bottom
- Apply finish to the piece. Loosen the piece in the chuck and slide out so that it is away from the shoulder but still firmly mounted to the chuck
- Sand
- Apply sanding sealer by hand using towel
- Using Mylands sanding sealer cut 1/2 with lacquer thinner
- Let it dry for a bit. It will raise the grain so she sands it again with 320 grit (Previous was 220)
- She likes to sand it with the lathe in reverse
- Sand to 400 grit or even 600 grit Abrasive paste and finishing paste (Yorkshire grit, Hampshire Sheen)
- Apply abrasive paste by hand with lathe off
- Turn on lathe, slow speed, and work it into the wood
- Buff off with the clean side of the towel and remove all residue
- Now apply the finishing paste by hand with the lathe off
- Doesn't need a lot- Turn on lathe ... Start slow and work it eventually turning the lathe up to high speed.

BEADS OF COURAGE

Beads of Courage challenge: We need enough entries to fill a display case at the State Fair this year. Don't be shy, we can do it. The size of the box, as a minimum, must be 5 inches wide x 6 inches deep. These boxes do not have to be round, they can also square. Of course, you can make them larger, to allow the kiddo's to put all their beads in a safe place. Go to www.beadsofcourage.org to see to whom you will be making these boxes. Don't forget to bring your boxes to the meetings, and put them into the instant gallery. Scott Eckstein is our official representative for the local hospitals, give him your box(s) for delivery to the hospitals.
